An Overview of Jeremiah

The book alternates between sections with considerable narrative content (largely biographical) and sections that are almost all poetic oracles.

1. Biographical, 1. Jeremiah's call. 1:4-10 Lesson: God chooses, equips, and calls us to serve him.

2. Oracles, 2-25. Judgment on Judah. Lesson: God will punish those who sin against him.

a) The first four sections (chh. 2-13) incrementally build up a fourfold picture of sin, judgment, mourning, and restoration.

1) 2 the *rib* (formal complaint): Judah has sinned. 2:9-13

2) 3-6 the example of Israel: sin brings judgment. 5:10-18

3) 7-10 the temple sermon: Sin, Judgment, Mourning. 8:18-9:1

4) 11-13 Scrapbook: sin, judgment, mourning, restoration. (But there is a hint of restoration as early as 4:27; 5:10,18). 12:14-17

b) The next three sections (14-24) show that the opportunity for response is limited.

1) 14-17, Covenant Judgments (cf. Lev. 26): the *kind* of response needed is true repentance, not superficial prayer. 14:10-12; 17:24-27

2) 18-20, the Potter: the time of repentance must be now, not later. 18:1-6; 19:1,10-11

3) 21-24, Zedekiah's question: shows that the nation's response was the wrong kind at the wrong time. 21:1-7

c) 25, Judgment and Revenge: a capstone of the entire judgment section. 25:28-33

3. Biographical, 26-29. Jeremiah's relations with the Priests and Prophets. 26:1-9 Lesson: Organized religion is an enemy of God's people.

4. Oracles and Biography, 30-33. Promise of Restoration; New Covenant. 31:31-40 Lesson: God will restore Israel under a new covenant.

5. Biographical, 34-45. Jeremiah's relations with Kings. 39:15-18 Lesson: Even in judgment, God protects his remnant.

Lesson: God will judge all nations, not just Israel.

d) 49:1-6, Sons of Ammon (restoration, 6)
e) 49:7-22, Edom
f) 49:23-27, Damascus

h) 49:34-39, Elam (restoration, 39)
i) ch. 50-51, Babylon

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7. Historical Epilog: 52 = 2 Kings 24:18-25:30. According to 51:64, this is not part of the main body of the book.
