

Structure of Psalm 78

Psalm 78, Forgetting God's Ways

- 1-11, Purpose ("fathers," "mighty works")
 - 1-4, Invitation to remember
 - 5-7, Command not to forget
 - 8-11, Failure: "they ... forgat"
- 12-39, First Cycle: Wilderness
 - 12-16, Gracious Acts
 - 17-20, Rebellion
 - 21-33, Divine Wrath & Punishment
 - 34-35, Petition: "they remembered"
 - 36-37, Rebuke
 - 38-39, Restoration: "he remembered"
- 40-72, Second Cycle: Egypt & Canaan
 - 40-55, Gracious Acts: "they remembered not"
 - 56-58, Rebellion
 - 59-64, Divine Wrath & Punishment
 - 65-72, Restoration

The Contrast in Psalm 77

Ps 77	1-9 (esp. 7-9): theological questioning leads to despair	11-20: focus on God's mighty acts brings confidence
1 Ti 6	1Ti 6:3 If any man teach otherwise, and consent not to wholesome words, even the words of our Lord Jesus Christ, and to the doctrine which is according to godliness; 4 He is proud, knowing nothing, but doting about questions and strifes of words, whereof cometh envy, strife, railings, evil surmisings, 5 Perverse disputings of men of corrupt minds, and destitute of the truth, supposing that gain is godliness: from such withdraw thyself.	6 But godliness with contentment is great gain.
2 Ti 2	23 But foolish and unlearned questions avoid, knowing that they do gender strifes.	22 Flee also youthful lusts: but follow righteousness, faith, charity, peace, with them that call on the Lord out of a pure heart.
